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**ROLL CALL** – Anderson, Gustin, Plothow, Ramsey, Sahaidachny, and Wolfe were all present. Councilperson Russell was absent.

**READING & CORRECTING JOURNAL** - of minutes of Regular Meeting on February 6, 2023

Councilperson Wolfe moved, seconded by Councilperson Plothow, to adopt the minutes with two minor corrections.

Gustin: Reported that Solid Waste has a new director, Jenny Gatliff.

#### RESOLUTION #3-2023

### **RESOLUTION #4-2023**

### A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING RATE TRACKING FACTOR FOR THE CITY OF PERU MUNICIPAL WATER UTILITY

Councilperson Wolfe, seconded by Council Member Plothow, to consider Resolution # 4, 2023. Motion carried with 6 Ayes. After some discussion, it was moved and seconded to adopt Resolution #4, 2023. Motion Passed with 6 Ayes.

### MOTION CARRIED

### A REQUEST FROM THE MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE FOR \$40,000 FOR REPAIRS TO THE COURSE

Garry Clark from the Municipal Golf Course asked for an appropriation of \$40,000 out of the golf course fund to be used to fund repairs to the irrigation system. He presented an itemized list totaling \$39,499.85. The council thanked him for the information. However, due to a misinterpretation of where the money was coming from, he will have to come back to the April meeting to request the fund transfer from the unappropriated non-reverting fund to the golf operating budget.

# A REQUEST FROM PERU VISUAL ARTS FESTIVAL TO HOST THE SECOND ANNUAL EVENE AND FOR COMMUNITY AND FINANCIAL SUPORT

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Patrick Redmon and Marlee Mickelson appeared before the council to advocate for the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Visual Arts Festival. This will take place on May 13<sup>th</sup>, 2023, and will involve closing parts of 5<sup>th</sup> street and Broadway. They also asked if any financial support could be allocated to them. They were told that there are a number of non-for-profit activities during the year and the city needs to adopt some type of plan to ensure equity among them. They were thanked for their presentation.

### **RESOLUTION 5, 2023**

### A RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FROM ARP FUND FOR SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS.

It was moved by councilperson Wolfe, seconded by councilperson Anderson to table this motion under the April meeting because it had not yet been advertised. Motion carried.

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### **COMMUNICATIONS**

Councilperson Plothow introduced Matthew from Enviro Forensics who works with communities dealing with environmental issues. He offered his firm's services with a price of between \$3000 and \$5000 per month initially. This would not necessarily be a reoccurring monthly fee. He explained how they had helped Franklin Indiana. The council members had several questions for him. It was decided not to engage his firm at the present time. IDEM is aware of the situation and has been involved in the meetings and discussions that have taken place. They conducted a meeting on March 2, 2023, along with state representative Ethan Manning in the City Council chambers in City Hall. They have been very proactive in their efforts to get the answers to this problem and are still doing testing at various sites around the extended perimeter area of Schneider Electric.

Janice Edwards was present and represented many residents of the former Leonda mobile home park. The park has been sold to out of town investors and they have made a number of demands of the current residents and also raised their monthly lot rent. Several residents also spoke about their situation and difficulties with the new leases and rules and regulations. While the council empathized with their plight, there is nothing the city can directly do. A member of the audience suggested that they contact Carmen Long with Indiana Legal Help. She is available in the courthouse each Monday.

### ADJOURNMENT:

With nothing further to come before this meeting, Councilperson Gustin made a move to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Anderson. All said Aye.
